Events Committee News

The Events Committee closed out 2022 with one of our signature events, The Festival of Lights. Held over a two-day period, this year's Festival featured several new events.

House Decorating Contest. There were two categories, individual house (10 entries) and group (4 entries). Our judges, Bruce Allen, Arlene Binkowski, and Pam Hester chose the following winners:

Crafters' Market. Sixteen talented crafters, both groups and individuals, participated this year. A wide variety of crafts were offered, ranging from jewelry to quilted décor pieces to wall art to clothing. Attendance was strong and many participants made generous donations to causes like the Victory Garden (Loose Threads), The Alzheimer's Association (Jill Robbins), and the Salvation Army (Pam Evans). A few of our crafters came to us through Al Vitale's association with the Apple Country Wood Crafters. This group makes and donates toys to underprivileged children in our area and their participation in our event helps support their efforts.



The Cove Tones / Lighting of the Tree. We began Saturday evening with a buffet dinner presented by The Eagle Bar and Grill. Nearly 100 residents joined us for dinner, and many stayed after eating to listen to The Cove Tones serenade us and lead us in some carols. After the Cove Tones, many of our Teslaowning neighbors had a little surprise for the crowd. They quietly (get it...quietly because they are electric...) gathered along the roadway behind the clubhouse and had their cars play a synchronized version of "Carol of the Bells" complete with flashing lights and dancing mirrors.



Then it was time for the special moment when we light the community Christmas Tree and menorah. Robin led the crowd in a countdown and just like that the holiday season arrived at Cummings Cove.

The festivities continued Sunday with a few new events.

Holiday Cookie Exchange. Twelve bakers gathered and exchanged cookies, recipes, and stories. Delicious samples were enjoyed along with hot cocoa and cider.

Gingerbread House Decorating Contest. Eight contestants, including one of our youngest residents, created whimsical and intricate gingerbread houses starting with a kit and letting their imaginations run wild from there. Our three judges Lyn Blake, Shauna Bradley (a trained pastry chef), and Bonnie Reuscher surely had a hard time deciding on a winner. In the end they awarded first place to April Bonfanti and Marti Moore, second place to Cher and Hannah Silvius, and third place to The Pazoles Family in the kit with embellishments category. Lantern Walk and Social. Sunday evening had two closing events. Robin led a group of walkers from the clubhouse to the Triple Fairways Pavilion for the Lantern Walk and Holiday Social. Our music staff provided the soundtrack for the Social and two resident volunteers, Cathy MacEwan and Swee Wong led a group in a few line dances set to Christmas music.

We are obviously a golf community, but Pickleball? What is Pickleball? For those new to Cummings Cove, Pickleball is a court sport played on a badminton-sized court with the net set to a height of 34 inches at the center. It is played with a perforated plastic ball and composite or wooden paddles about twice the size of ping-pong paddles. It can be played indoors or outdoors and is easy for beginners to learn, but can develop into a fast-paced, competitive game for experienced players. In addition, the game has developed a passionate following due to its friendly, social nature, and its multi-generational appeal. Pickleball can be played as singles or doubles. New players can learn the basic rules quickly. No special apparel is needed – just something comfortable and appropriate for a court sport. Equipment is inexpensive and easily portable. Watch for announcements this spring for the annual Cummings Cove Introduction to Pickleball event.

Our Pickleball courts are now less crowded than in the summer months. Some of our regulars have headed to warmer weather for the winter, but the dedicated core players continue to take advantage of decent temperatures to enjoy exercise and socialization.
